

Natasha Solomons


Such is the power and wealth of the Goldbaums that on dull days, it's said, they hire the sun just for themselves.

But with the Great War looming, the House of Goldbaum, along with Europe herself, is about to break apart.




February 19

Jacqueline Woodson, one of today's finest writers, tells the moving story of her childhood in mesmerizing verse.






